# Style Definitions

- Webster
  - Distinctive quality, form, or type of something
  - A particular manner or technique by which something is done, created, or performed
- Nate Torres
  - The way in which a photographer approaches their subject matter and creates their images. It is a combination of technical and creative choices, including the use of lighting, composition, color, contrast, and other elements that work together to create a cohesive aesthetic.
- Opera Aria AI
  - A unique and recognizable aesthetic or approach that a photographer applies to their work. . A photographer's style is a reflection of their artistic vision, personal preferences, and creative choices, which distinguish their work from others. It may enable viewers to recognize and connect with the photographer's images.

# Technical Elements of Photographic Style

- Line
- Texture
- Shape
- Form
  - Three-dimensional aspect: depth and dimension
- Pattern
- Color
- Space
  - Positive and negative
- Composition
- Lighting
- Editing
  - Post processing
- Mood

**Style includes these elements,  
but style is more than the sum of its parts**

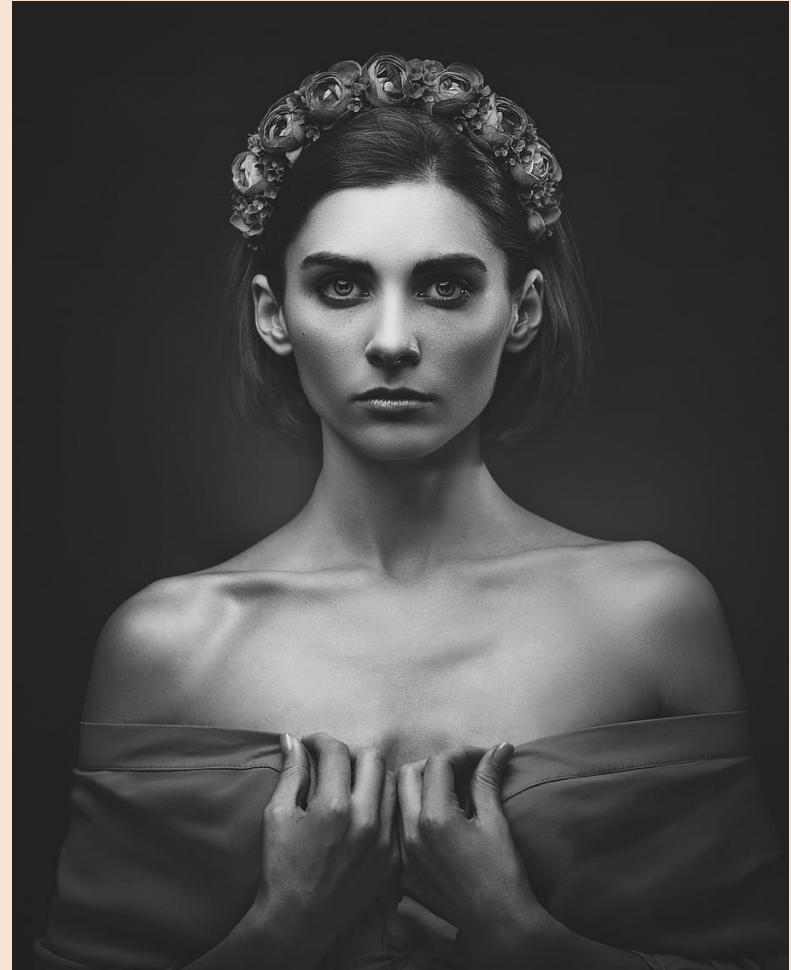

# How to create personal photographic style (Nate Torres)

- Specialize
- Do what you do, but differently
- Research
- Improvise, adapt, overcome
- Observe your own work (difficult)
- Identify Your Re-occurring Elements or Designs
- Assess the Themes and Moods
- Write It Down in a Journal (Before and after)
- Ask for Others' Opinions

# Creating Your Own Style in Photography (Alan Schaller)

- Spend your time doing the things you are good at, and get better at them.
- Don't buy kit because someone else likes it. Discover what works for you and use that.
- Shoot as often as you can, and have a camera with you all the time
- Look at other photographers' work. Don't copy it, but appreciate their ideas and methods and see how those things might help your own work
- Don't feel limited by the 'rules' of photography. Do your own thing. Concentrate on making the pictures you like.

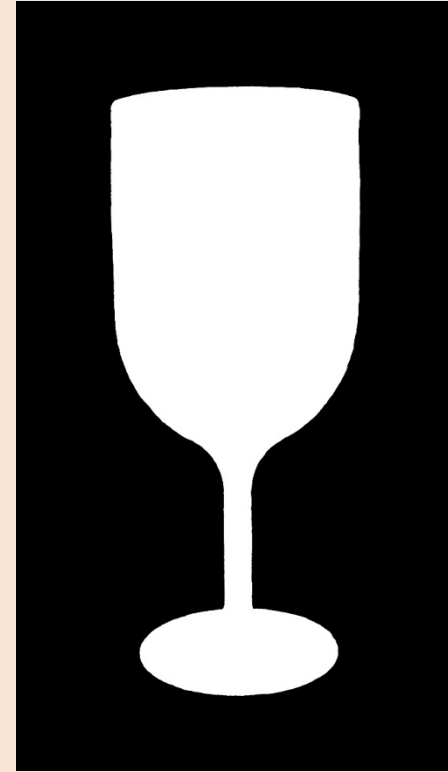
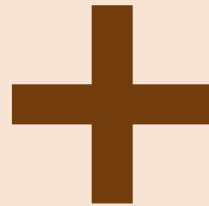

<b>Attribute</b>	<b>Photoshop</b>	<b>Lightroom</b>
Introduced	1987	2007
Scope	Manipulation, creation, and enhancement of single images. Pixel level perfection. Fine-tuning, retouching, precise local adjustments.	Organizing and processing groups of photos. Quick access to frequently used controls.
Target user base	Creative professionals. Photographers as well as photo retouchers, fine artists, graphic designers, compositing artists, etc..	Photographers
